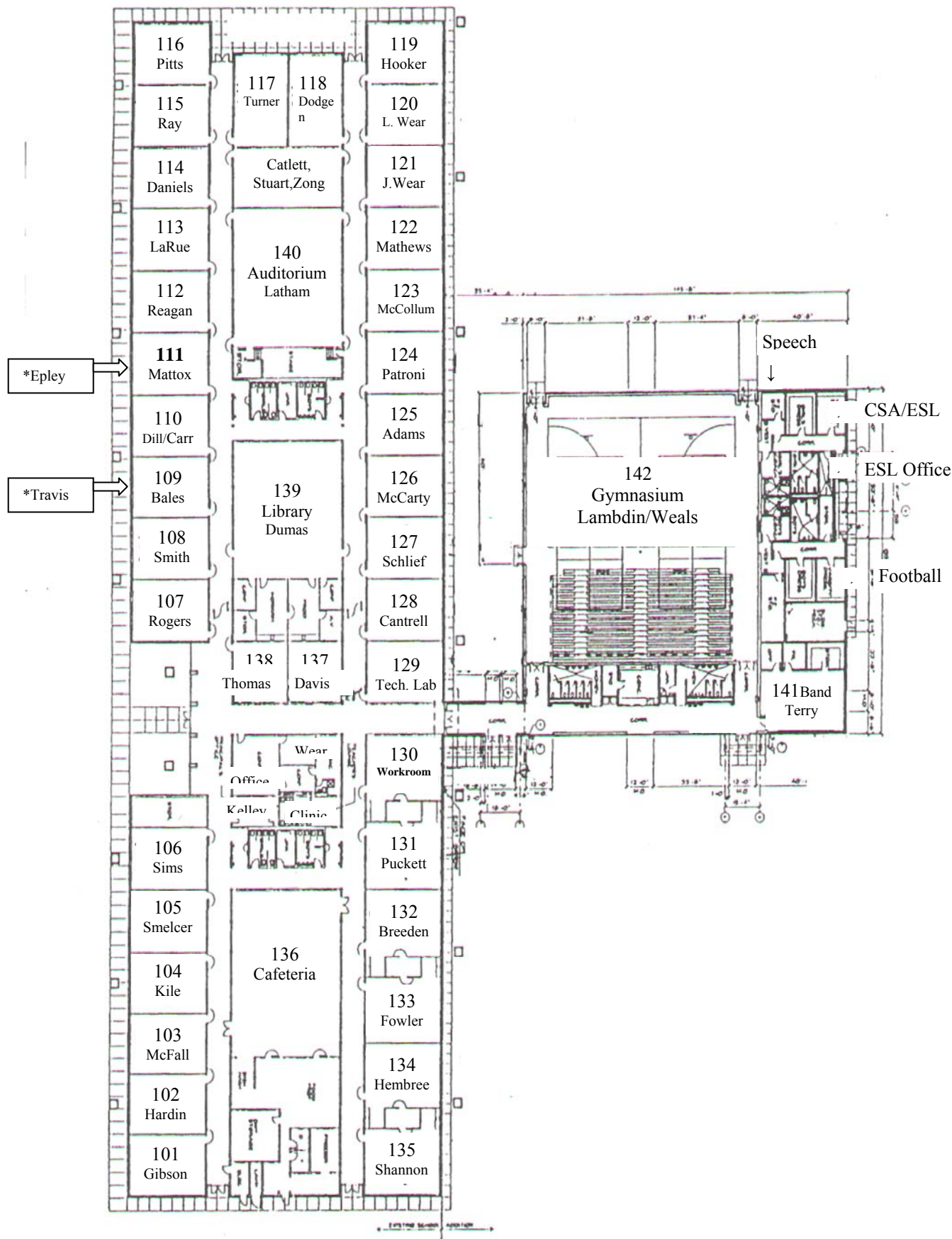

SCHOOL HOURS

School doors will open at 7:30 a.m. Students arriving before 8:00 a.m. must go to the gymnasium and be seated. Students are dismissed from the gymnasium at 7:55 a.m. to report to their classrooms. Classes begin at 8:00 a.m.

Breakfast will be served from 7:30-8:00 a.m. in the cafeteria. Second breakfast will be brought to the homerooms from 8:00 – 8:15 a.m. Students are not allowed in any other areas of the building before school begins.

In the afternoon, bus riders will be dismissed to the gym at 2:50. Car riders and walkers will be dismissed at 2:55. Car pick up is in the front of school building. Students are not allowed to walk across the parking lot or driveway. Students may not be dropped off or picked up at the gymnasium. Your child's safety is our concern; no student should be left unsupervised. Parents should pick up students promptly before 3:00 p.m. or call the school in case of emergency. Students who are picked up before 2:50 p.m. will be counted absent.

Students who have signed permission slips may leave school at 2:55 p.m. to walk to the community center. Remember the community center offers programs in which children can participate. This is not a daycare. There is no direct supervision or responsibility by the city to watch your children. Your children may come and go as they please. You must be responsible for your own children.

BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB

Bus 007 will pick up all enrolled students going to the Boys and Girls Club. This is treated as a regular bus service to members. Notification of your child's participation in Boys and Girls Club is requested.

RIDING A SCHOOL BUS

Riding a school bus is a privilege extended to the student, and it can be taken away at any time for disruptive or unsatisfactory conduct or endangering the safety of students. All pupils being transported are under the authority of the school bus driver and must obey his/her requests. Special regulations are posted in the front of the bus. Students may be assigned a seat. No student can exchange this seat without the bus driver's permission. Some buses are monitored with video cameras. Smoking is not permitted on the school bus or school grounds. Let's work together to make this an accident-free year.

CAFETERIA

Our school provides a nutritious hot lunch at a reasonable price. Students are permitted to bring their lunch from home, but they may not bring carbonated drinks in cans or bottles. Ordering lunch out is prohibited.

Extra milk and juice are sold. You may pay by the day or in advance by the week, month, or year.

ATTENDANCE AND MAKE-UP WORK

Excessive unexcused absences can result in deduction of grade points. Repeated unexcused absences can result in parents being required to explain absences to the Truancy Court. **The office will accept four parent notes each semester for absences.** Doctor notes will be required for any absence following. Tardiness is a part of the attendance policy. Students must be at school and in their classroom at 8:00 a.m. Often times tardies are beyond the student's control, but without a proper excuse they will count against the student and disciplinary action may be taken. Be at school and in your class on time. You are late if you arrive to class after 8:00 a.m. **After four tardies, you will be assigned after-school detention to make up work you missed.** The same penalty will result if you do not arrive to class with your textbook, paper, pencil, and any assignment. Parents, it is your responsibility to see that the student is here on time.

Students who miss school must bring a written excuse from their parents or guardian. Parent's notes should be brought to the attendance office before reporting to homerooms. Notes will not be accepted after 10 days from the date of return. Students are excused for the following reasons:

Unexcused absences may result in points being deducted from student's grades.

Make-up work will be given to students with excused absences. The student will be given one school day for each excused day absent to make up schoolwork. Make-up work will be accepted as follows:

The student will have one day grace for each day missed. Do not interrupt teachers to get make-up work during class time; you may call the office to request make-up work for extended absences only. Assignments may be picked up in the school office after 2:30 p.m. Makeup work may also be obtained from the website: www.pfmiddle.org. Students absent only one day may pick up their assignment the following day.

FAMILY VACATION OR TRIPS

The principal may approve up to five days for trips during the year if the student is in good academic standing. Additional vacations during the year will not be approved. Trips longer than five days must be approved by the superintendent. Permission should be **requested in writing in advance of leaving for the trip.**

IN CASE OF BAD WEATHER

In case of unexpected bad weather, please do not call the school. Our phones must be kept open for emergencies. For any special instructions, listen to our local radio station or the Knoxville radio and TV stations.

FIELD TRIPS

Pigeon Forge Middle School students take field trips during the year to enrich their classroom experience. These trips are carefully planned. Parents are welcome to participate in these trips when there is space available. They are expected to pay the full price.

Major field trips require a great deal of planning and responsibility for the sponsors. Students who cannot behave themselves at school may not be able to attend these trips. Students who are not passing classes, who are missing assignments, who do not demonstrate appropriate behavior, who do not demonstrate expected levels of personal responsibility and social maturity, and who are not capable of strenuous physical activity may not be allowed to participate in field trips and/or special events. In some cases a parent may be required to go on field trips with his/her child if any unruly student is allowed to attend.

A non-refundable deposit may be required of students participating in field trips that require long range planning and chartered buses not owned by the Sevier County System. The cost of such buses is very expensive, and the cost of the trip is based on the cost of a full bus. The school is being charged the same price if we have a full bus or one that is half full.

DISCIPLINE

Discipline is primarily the responsibility of the classroom teacher. Every teacher at Pigeon Forge Middle School has the authority to help in the maintenance of good order within our school. It is the responsibility of each student to cooperate with all teachers and staff. Every student has the right to a good education. No student has the right to deprive another student of that right to a good education. Good order in the classrooms and on school grounds can provide all students with the environment that will encourage success in school. The principal and the vice principals will insure that order is maintained at Pigeon Forge Middle school. Parents should join with the school staff to support a well-disciplined school.

Pigeon Forge Middle School also strives to recognize positive student behavior. As part of our **Positive Behavior Plan**, students who are following our school rules (Be Responsible, Be Respectful, Be Prepared, and Be Safe and Orderly) may earn special classroom, grade level, and school privileges/activities. Students exhibiting positive behaviors will be issued **Tiger Cash** that they may use to purchase these special privileges/activities.

BEHAVIORS THAT LEAD TO SERIOUS DISCIPLINARY ACTION:

1. Disruption of school/class
2. Damage, vandalism, or theft of school or personal property
3. Physical/verbal abuse of others
4. Possession of weapons, fireworks, or other dangerous objects
5. Possession or use of tobacco products, alcohol, or drugs
6. Uncooperative with faculty or staff
7. Truancy
8. Chewing gum
9. Refusal to accept disciplinary action
10. Profanity or vulgarity
11. Gambling
12. Inappropriate bus conduct
13. Rude or disrespectful behavior
14. Cheating
15. Altering records
16. Repeated violations of school rules
17. Unauthorized leaving of school grounds
18. Other inappropriate behavior

BEHAVIORS SUCH AS THESE MAY RESULT IN THE FOLLOWING DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS:

Writing Assignments: Students may be assigned extra written assignments as a result of inappropriate behavior.

In-School Suspension: Students will do class work in an area isolated from classmates. This suspension will take place on Tuesday or Thursday of each week.

After-School Detention: Students will stay after school from 3:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. to complete assignments not finished, as a result of five or more tardies to school, not being prepared for class, not completing work assigned, or because of other inappropriate behavior.

Out-of-School Suspension: The length of out-of-school suspension will be determined by the school administration and will reflect the seriousness of the offense committed.

Alternative School: Isolation in another school setting.

Corporal Punishment: Corporal punishment is prescribed by the Sevier County Board of Education. It will be administered when a teacher or administrator deems it to be appropriate. Any parent may request in writing each year that their child not be paddled. When a note is on file in the school office, the student will not be paddled. Other options will be used.

MEDICATION

Students must bring all medication to the classroom teacher. Medication should be brought in the original package with description and directions for administering the medication. Medication administration forms are available from the school secretary and must be completed by a parent. Students may not carry prescription or over the counter drugs with them without special permission from the school officials. State law prevents faculty/school nurses from giving student's aspirin or other medication without direction from a medical provider. Violation of this policy will result in disciplinary action.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Radios, tape/CD players, cell phones, cameras, jewelry, electronic games, large amounts of money and other expensive items are not allowed to be brought to school. Misuse of such items creates a disruption in the classroom and interferes with school. The school will not be responsible for personal property, including band instruments, brought to school. All band instruments should be placed in safe areas during the school day. Most students need to take such instruments home in the evening to practice their music. Students may not buy or sell personal property at school. Skateboards are not allowed at school.

Items taken up by teachers or administrators will result in the following disciplinary actions. The first offense will result in the student receiving one day of ISS with the item being returned at the end of the day. On second offense, parents will be required to pick up the item(s) and the student will be assigned three days of ISS. The third offense will result in the student being remanded to the ALC or suspended and the item kept until the end of the semester. Dangerous items or pornographic materials will not be given back to students.

TEXTBOOKS

Textbooks are on loan to students for their use during the school year. They are to be kept clean and handled with care. Be sure your name is in the front of your book. Students will pay for damaged or lost books. Students will not be issued books until payment is received or lost books are returned. Students may not attend field trips, soc hops, concessions or extra curricular events, if they have lost books. Replacement costs may be obtained in the school office. The same rules, policies, and consequences apply to library books on loan to students.

PARENT CONFERENCES

Parents are welcomed and encouraged to come to school to talk with teachers. Appointments must be made to coincide with the teachers' schedules. Call 453-2401 to set up the conference. Conference days

or before and after school appointments are best. Parent conferences will be held after school the first Tuesday after grade cards.

STUDENT INSURANCE

Accident insurance is offered to all students at a very reasonable rate. We encourage all students to participate. All students who participate in school sponsored athletic activities must show proof of insurance.

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

Parents are encouraged to take part in our school. We always need helpers in the following areas: library, volunteer first aid clinic, technology lab, classrooms, sports and school-wide events, and on the Library Advisory Committee, PTO committees, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Advisory Committees. Contact the principal, school secretary, or your child's teacher.

PTO

Parents are invited to attend all PTO meetings. Membership can be purchased at orientation or any time during the first two months of school. We need volunteers to help in class projects and special events at school. Come be a part of your child's school. The help will be deeply appreciated by the teachers and students. It takes all of us working together to make a great school for your child.

ZERO-TOLERANCE BEHAVIOR

In order to ensure a safe and secure learning environment free from drugs, violence and dangerous weapons, any student who engages in the following behaviors will be subject to suspension for a period of not less than one (1) calendar year. The superintendent shall have the authority on a case-by-case basis.

1. Students who bring or unlawfully possess a drug or a dangerous weapon onto a school bus, onto school property or to any school event or activity.
2. Any student who, while on a school bus, on school property, or while attending and school event or activity.
 - (A) Unlawfully possesses a drug or dangerous weapon; or
 - (B) Commits battery on a teacher, or other employee of the school. T.C.A. 49-6-4018

It is an offense for any person, adult or student, to possess or carry, whether openly or concealed, with the intent to go armed, any firearm, explosive, explosive weapon, Bowie knife, hawk bill knife, ice pick, dagger, slingshot, lead cane, switchblade knife, blackjack, knuckles or any other weapon of like kind, not used solely for instructional or school sanctioned ceremonial purposes.

VISITORS

Visitors must report to the office to receive an ID to permit them to walk through the building and grounds. Student visitors are not permitted. This precaution is for school safety and required by State Law.

PROGRESS REPORT

Progress reports are sent after the third week of the six weeks grading period. These progress reports are contained in this book following the handbook pages. Grade cards are sent five days after the end of the six weeks period. Parents are required to sign and return both progress and grade card reports.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

Tennis shoes and appropriate clothing for exercise are required for the physical education program. All students must participate or have an excuse from a physician.

PARENTS RIGHT TO KNOW

"Parents Right to Know" – NCLB requires that all schools notify parents of all children that they have a right to request and receive timely information on the professional qualifications of the teachers and paraprofessionals working with their children.

FERPA

The “Family Educations Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a federal law, requires that the Sevier County School system, with certain exceptions, obtain written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child’s education records. However, the Sevier County School System may disclose appropriately designated “directory information” without written consent, unless you have advised the system to the contrary in accordance with system procedures. If you do not want the Sevier County School System to disclose directory information from your child’s education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the system in writing within one week of enrollment in the Sevier County School System.

Parents are encourages to carefully review the FERPA notice which is distributed for parent signature at each school annually.

DISCRIMINATION

The Sevier County School System does not discriminate on the basis of race, sex, color, religion, national origin, age, handicap, or veteran status in provision of educational opportunities, programs, activities, or employment opportunities and benefits. Inquiries or completed grievance forms should be referred to Larry Stott, Title VI Coordinator; or Mike Helton, Title XI Coordinator; at 226 Cedar Street, Sevierville, Tennessee 37862.

HARASSMENT

Pigeon Forge Middle will not tolerate harassment of others. Physical, sexual, racial, religious, ethnic, or verbal harassment will not be acceptable in the classroom, at school events or events on school property. Any person(s) believing his/her self to be the victim of harassment should report the alleged incident to the school principal, Jerry Wear. Written reports may be mailed to Pigeon Forge Middle School, C/O Jerry Wear, 300 Wears Valley Road, Pigeon Forge, TN 37863. Mr. Wear may also be contacted directly at (865) 453-2401. Bullying of any description should be reported to your child’s teacher, guidance counselor, and/or administration.

SAFE SCHOOL CHOICE

Every public school shall annually notify parents that if their child is the victim of a violent crime at school, the child has the right to attend another grade-appropriate public school in the district.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH IN TRANSITION

The Sevier County School System will ensure that all children and youth receive a free appropriate public education and are given meaningful opportunities for success in school. The system will follow the requirements outlined in the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act. A copy of the policies related to McKinney-Vento will be available in the school office.

PHONE USE

Cell phones must be turned off during the school day and kept in a secure place out of sight of students. Students may not use cell phones inside the school building at any time including text messaging and photos. Students who need to contact a parent may obtain a phone pass and use the designated phone in the office. The school will not be responsible for lost cell phones. Text-messaging or photos sent during classroom assignments will result in disciplinary action and a grade of (F) on classwork transmitted. Cell phones confiscated from students for misuse will follow the same policy as radios, CD’s, etc.

Parents and students are expected to make afternoon arrangements before coming to school, and students are expected to be prepared for school upon arrival. Students will not be allowed to use the office phone to obtain permission slips, homework, practice clothes, etc. Such use of the office phone causes disruptions and interferes with school operations.

STANDARDIZED DRESS AND GROOMING CODE AT PIGEON FORGE MIDDLE

FOR GRADES 5 THROUGH 8

The Sevier County School System recognizes the effect which student dress and grooming have upon student behavior and commitment to learning. Attire considered disruptive to health or safety is not appropriate. The following rules concerning dress and grooming are mandatory at Pigeon Forge Middle School:

Bottom Wear (Waist and Below, Pants, Skirts, Shorts, Skorts)

Bottom wear must be size appropriate for the wearer, with no sagging or bagging, and must be worn securely at and around the waist so as not to reveal undergarments and to prevent pant legs from touching the floor. Large bell-bottoms that expose less than one-fourth of the foot, large pockets, spandex, or leggings shall not be allowed.

Skirts, shorts, or skorts must be no shorter in length than four (4) inches above the knee in grades 5 through 8. Slits must be no higher than four (4) inches above the knee in grades 5 through 8.

Belts

Belts are required if pants have belt loops. Belts may be fabric or leather only.

Top Wear (Waist and Above)

Shirts must be size appropriate for the wearer, have sleeves which cover the top of the deltoid muscle, and be worn either tucked in or no more than three inches below the top of the waistband, but in no event shall the bottom of the shirt cover any portion of a pocket opening. Bare midriffs shall not be allowed. Size-appropriate fleece pullovers; light jackets; long sleeve crewneck, v-neck, or cardigan sweater vests; or sweatshirts may be worn over an approved shirt.

Dresses

Girls may wear dresses appropriately sized for the wearer with the length no shorter than four (4) inches above the knee in grades 5 through 8. Dresses may either have sleeves or be a sleeveless dress as long as no undergarments are visible. Dresses will not have string or spaghetti straps, but will have straps that come to the edge of the shoulder.

Shoes

Shoes must be worn at all times.

Coats

Coats, heavy jackets, or raincoats shall not be worn inside the building unless otherwise directed by the school principal or his/her designee in an unusual situation.

All Apparel

Clothing shall be neat, clean, hemmed, and shall not have holes, rips, cuts, or frayed edges. Articles of clothing shall not be worn which imply or promote alcohol, sex, drugs, tobacco, violence, gangs, racial slurs, or offensive language.

Head

No headgear or sunglasses will be worn in the building (except those worn for obvious medical reasons and the results therefore).

Accessories

Any accessory that is studded, spiked, contains chains or can tabs, or in any way presents a potential danger to self or others is prohibited.

Other

Tattoos, whether permanent or temporary, will be covered if possible. Visible body piercing jewelry (except of the ears) is prohibited. Hair is not to be sprayed or dyed in unnatural colors (such as blue, pink, green, orange, yellow, purple, red etc.), spiked, or mohawked.

Special Days

Schools may develop special dress days for special occasions at the direction of the school principal.

Special Situations:

If a student cannot comply with the standardized dress code based on special conditions or religious beliefs, his or her parent or guardian may write a letter explaining the situation to the Superintendent or his/her designee, with a copy to the school principal or his/her designee. Each case will be dealt with on an individual basis. To insure the health and safety of students, the school principal or his/her designee is allowed to further restrict manner of dress or style of hair in specific curriculum areas (shop, chemistry lab, etc.).

Book Bags

Book bags must be constructed from materials that allow the contents of the book bag to be visible. Any band instrument or necessary sports bags must be dropped off at an area designated by the building level principal.

Any student not attired in accordance with the foregoing policy shall be subject to disciplinary consequences as per board policy. In addition to the foregoing, when a student is attired in a manner that is likely to cause disruption or interference with the operation of the school, the principal shall take appropriate action.

Legal Reference: T.C.A. 49-6-4215**Violations of the dress code will result in the following consequences:**

- 1st Offense** = Copy Dress Policy
- 2nd Offense** = After School Detention
- 3rd Offense** = ISS
- 4th Offense** = Suspension from School

INTERNET USE

Internet access is available to students and teachers in the Sevier County School System. Our goal in providing this service to students and teachers is to promote educational excellence in schools by facilitating resource sharing, innovation and communication. Internet use is a privilege, not a right, and the misuse of which may result in the termination of an individual's right to use this service. A copy of the board's complete policy will be available in the school office or on the school system web site at <http://www.sevier.org>. All students and parents must sign an Internet Use Agreement form as part of the registration process. No student will be allowed to use any computer on the PFMS campus without having this signed agreement.
